Tuesday, March 22, 2011 <u>Genetic Eye Conditions in Golden Retrievers</u> Presented by Dr. Ruth M. Marrion

Hereditary cataracts are a common canine eye problem and can develop at varying ages. Some Golden Retrievers that carry the genes for central progressive retinal atrophy, which is a progressive deterioration of the light receptive area of the eye.

The big news regarding eyes concerns **pigmentary uveitis**, a progressive disease of Golden Retrievers, characterized by the appearance of pigment in the front part of the dog's lens and associated with the development of glaucoma and blindness.

Please join us on March 22 to learn about these important health issues with Dr. Ruth Marrion. Dr. Marrion has been doing **YANKEE**'s eye clinics for the last couple of years, and will doing our upcoming spring clinic.
